CITY'S NEW ORGANICS PROGRAM STARTS JULY 1 FOR SINGLE-FAMILY HOMES

The City of Folsom is committed to providing safe, reliable, and high-quality waste and recycling services that comply with state mandates and preserve our city's distinctive natural environment and excellent quality of life.

As part of this effort, the city's new business and apartment community organics program began in March. The city's organics recycling program for single-family homes starts July 1. City residents in single-family homes must bag food and food-soiled paper into compostable or clear plastic bags and place it in the green bin (currently used for yard waste). Green bins will be serviced weekly, along with garbage. Blue bin recycling (bottles, cans, paper products) will continue to be serviced every other week.

State law now requires all businesses and residents to recycle organic waste. If you do not currently have all three cans at your home (gray trash, blue recycle, and green organics) you will automatically receive them after the program starts.

GREEN BIN APPROVED

- ✓ All food scraps (meat, bones, cheese, bread, pasta, fruit, vegetables, eggshells)
- ✓ Food-soiled paper (napkins, coffee filters, tea bags)
- ✓ Yard waste (do not bag plant trimmings)
- ✓ Wood scraps
- ✓ Bag food scraps and food-soiled paper in any compostable or clear plastic bags

NO, NOT GREEN BIN APPROVED

- ✗ Styrofoam/plastic containers
- ✗ Coated paper or cups
- ✗ Dirt or rocks
- ✗ Diapers or pet/human waste

Please place green bins curbside by 6 a.m. on your service day, three feet from your gray trash bins or other obstacles.

Thank you for your help in making the City of Folsom's organics recycling program a success! Working together, we can make a difference for our community and our planet.

GALLERY AT 48 NATOMA HOSTS "FAMOUS FACES" EXHIBIT

Hollywood celebrities, famous artists, and political figures are represented through ceramic sculpture by Karen Calden Fulk and digital paintings by Michael Tofanelli in the "Famous Faces" exhibit. "The human face and body language are an endless fascination," says Fulk. Her sculptures use expression and gesture to capture a classic moment of each of her famous subjects. "A good caricature is a shortcut to the truth of a character's portrait," says Tofanelli. His stylized celebrity and political caricature illustrations have appeared in countless local and national publications. The exhibit is free and open to the public through June 30. The adjacent Community Gallery showcases work by members of the El Dorado Hills Arts Association through June 24.

2022 CALIFORNIA PRIMARY ELECTION

All Sacramento County active registered voters will receive a vote-by-mail ballot for the June 7, 2022, primary election. Folsom City Hall will serve as a ballot drop box location. From Monday, May 9 through Tuesday, June 7, voters may drop off their ballot in a ballot drop box located in the downstairs lobby of Folsom City Hall, 50 Natoma Street.

The Folsom Community Center at 52 Natoma Street will host a vote center from Saturday, June 4 through Tuesday, June 7. At vote centers, individuals can vote, solve voter registration issues, register to vote, get a replacement ballot, and receive assistance—including help with accessible voting devices and language assistance.

PLACERVILLE ROAD CLOSURE

Northbound and southbound Placerville Road—between Alder Creek Parkway and White Rock Road—will be temporarily closed for work on Savannah Parkway and Mangini Parkway.

The new Savannah Parkway will parallel existing Placerville Road between Alder Creek Road and White Rock Road. The new road will include a center median and Class II bike lanes.

The eastern section of Mangini Parkway, between the current end of the road and Placerville Road, will also be constructed. This new section of roadway will create a connection to the eastern portion of the Folsom Plan Area at the intersection of Savannah Parkway and Mangini Parkway.

The City of Folsom is conducting a targeted multi-family and mixed-use housing study to evaluate design, density, and market feasibility for multi-family and residential mixed-use development along the East Bidwell Corridor, at the Glenn light rail station, and in the town center area of the Folsom Plan Area, south of US-50. Throughout this process, the city and its consultant will work with the public, housing stakeholders, and decision makers to evaluate design concepts supported by market feasibility analysis.

KNOW WHERE YOUR WATER GOES TO HELP WEATHER THE DROUGHT

Landscape watering is the single most significant use of water and accounts for up to 60% of citywide water use. To help our city weather California's drought, the following landscape watering restrictions are in effect:

- » Landscape watering is limited to a maximum of two days per week, except for drip irrigation, which may be conducted on any day.
- » Customers with street addresses that end with an odd number may irrigate only on Tuesdays and Saturdays. Customers with street addresses that end with an even number may irrigate only on Wednesdays and Sundays.
- » No irrigation is permitted on Mondays, Thursdays, or Fridays.
- » Avoid excessive watering that runs off onto sidewalks, streets, and gutters.
- » Track your water use in real-time with a Flume flow monitor; now just \$9, after an activation refund.

GRILLING FIRE SAFETY

When the warmer weather arrives, there's nothing better than the smell of food cooking on the grill. Stay fire safe this summer and follow these grilling safety tips from the Folsom Fire Department.

- » Only use your grill outside. Keep it at least 3 feet from siding, deck rails, and eaves.
- » Keep a 3-foot safe zone around your grill. Choose a smooth surface to set up your grill. Open your gas grill before lighting.
- » Keep an eye on your grill, fire pit, or patio torches. Don't walk away from them when they are lit.
- » Clean your grill after each use. This will remove grease that can start a fire.
- » Clothes catch fire instantly. Keep your clothes and sleeves away from the grill as much as possible.
- » Place the coals from your grill in a metal can with a lid once they have cooled.

CAPITAL SOUTHEAST CONNECTOR PROJECT UPDATE

A Folsom segment of the connector project will fully open to motorists in June. White Rock Road—from Prairie City Road to East Bidwell Street—has been reconstructed to a safer, higher-capacity four-lane expressway. The project also includes new traffic signals and a new bridge over Alder Creek. Construction will begin on the Scott Road Extension Project in May.

The Capital SouthEast Connector is the Sacramento region's largest approved transportation project. The planned 34-mile expressway will connect the southern area of Sacramento County to El Dorado County in the east and serve as a connection between Elk Grove, Rancho Cordova, and Folsom.
