The city is enforcing stricter penalties for illegal fireworks usage.



The City of Folsom is now enforcing stricter penalties for illegal fireworks usage. The Folsom City Council adopted a social host ordinance that levies \$1,000 fines against property owners that either use or allow the use of illegal fireworks on their property.

Calls for service increase dramatically on July 4, and emergency response resources are stretched extremely thin. During the holiday weekend, use 9-1-1 for emergencies only–like an active fire, injury, or an immediate threat to people or property.

OPEN SPACE CLOSURES IN FOLSOM DUE TO EXTREME FIRE RISK

Designated city-owned open spaces that have high fire risk potential remain off-limits in Folsom. The City of Folsom first issued an emergency order last summer in response to extreme fire danger. The emergency order remains in effect due to the ongoing extreme drought conditions and high fire risk.

All existing public trails, bicycle paths, and parks remain open for normal use. Closed areas are clearly marked with signage. Maps of temporarily closed city-owned open spaces are available

If you see or suspect illegal firework usage, call the Folsom Police Department at **916-461-6400**.

KNOW THE RISKS

- >> The unsafe use of fireworks can cause severe burns, amputations, blindness, and even death.
- Damaging fires occur when children use fireworks unsupervised by adults.
- Parents are responsible for any property damage or injuries caused by all fireworks.

KEEP IT LEGAL

All legal fireworks in California are called Safe and Sane Fireworks and must bear the State Fire Marshal's seal.

- Safe and Sane Fireworks may only be used and sold from noon June 28 through midnight on July 4.
- Any firework that goes up in the air or explodes is illegal and dangerous.

KEEP IT SAFE

- Always have a bucket of water to dispose of fireworks and leave them in the water overnight before disposing.
- Always have a hose connected to water available in case of fire.
- Do not use fireworks near dry grass or other flammable materials.
- Do not use fireworks while under a canopy, covered balcony, covered patio, or under a tree or bushes.

LET'S GET FOOD WASTE IN ITS PLACE!

RESIDENTIAL GREEN BIN ORGANICS PROGRAM STARTS NOW!

The City of Folsom's "Green Bin Approved" program complies with a new California law designed to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and compost organic waste. Beginning July 1, all Folsom residents can begin adding food scraps and food-soiled paper to their existing yard waste bin, now called the "green organics bin."

HOW TO COLLECT FOOD SCRAPS AND FOOD-SOILED PAPER

- 1. Find a container. A repurposed plastic tub or container works great. Residents can also pick up a kitchen countertop pail from the city at select local events.
- 2. Line your container with a clear plastic or compostable bag, which you can buy locally or online. You can also save produce bags or other see-through bags, such as bread bags.
- 3. When full, put bagged food scraps and food-soiled paper in your green organics bin for service.

COMMON QUESTIONS

WHAT IF I DON'T HAVE A YARD WASTE BIN?

You will receive one after the program begins. If you live in community with spatial constraints, the city will work with property owners to determine how to provide organics service.

WHY DO I NEED TO BAG FOOD SCRAPS AND FOOD-SOILED PAPER?

The industrial composter requires food scraps and food-soiled paper to be bagged for further processing and separation from yard waste.

 Fruit and vegetable trimmings, meat and bones, eggshells, bread and pasta, dairy, uneaten leftovers, expired food

FOOD-SOILED PAPER

 Napkins, coffee filters, tea bags, greasy pizza boxes, paper towels

YARD WASTE

• Lawn and leaf clippings, dried leaves, dead flowers

KNOW YOUR WATERING DAYS

The City of Folsom is currently in a Water Conservation "Water Warning"–Stage 3. Due to current drought conditions, the city is asking our water service customers to reduce water usage by 20%. Stage 3 restrictions include watering a maximum of two days per week, except drip irrigation, which may be conducted on any day, and following the city's odd-even irrigation schedule.

- >> Customers with street addresses ending in an odd number may irrigate on Tuesdays and Saturdays only.
- >> Customers with street addresses ending in an even number may irrigate on Wednesdays and Sundays only.
- >> No irrigation is permitted on Mondays, Thursdays, or Fridays.

SAVE THE TREES, STRESS THE LAWN

Help your trees stay healthy this summer with regular, deep, and slow watering. Even under water use restrictions, both the State of California and the City of Folsom recognize the importance of keeping your trees watered. Trees are important to the environment and are exempt from the city's rules limiting watering to two

FOLSOM'S COMMITMENT TO STEWARDSHIP OF THE LOWER AMERICAN RIVER

The Sacramento Water Forum is planning two projects to enhance crucial habitat for fall-run Chinook salmon and steelhead trout in the Lower American River at the Nimbus Basin and Lower Sailor Bar. The projects will start in August and finish in mid-October, before anadromous Chinook salmon return in high numbers from the Pacific Ocean to the Lower American River.

The Water Forum was established more than 20 years ago to balance the coequal objectives of reliable water supplies and environmental stewardship of the river. With support from members like the City of Folsom and state and federal partners, the Water Forum has invested over \$7 million to enhance over 30 acres of fish spawning beds and improve juvenile fish rearing habitat in the river. FREE COMPOST FOR FOLSOM RESIDENTS

Free compost is now available to all Folsom residents. Compost, mulch, and sand are available at two Folsom locations: behind City Hall at 50 Natoma Street and at the Hinkle Creek Nature Trail, next to Fire Station 36 at 9700 Oak Avenue Parkway.

The compost is made from yard trimmings collected throughout the region from residents, businesses, and apartment communities participating in curbside organics collection services.
