

WILD NIGHTS AND HOLIDAY LIGHTS

AT THE FOLSOM CITY ZOO SANCTUARY

This annual family event returns for the 14th year with thousands of bright lights, sparkling ornaments and trees, lighted animal figures, and displays transforming the zoo sanctuary with holiday spirit. Local caroling groups and musicians provide the merry sounds of the season, and the Folsom Valley Railway miniature train provides special nighttime rides. Wild Nights and Holiday Lights is open from 5 to 8:30 p.m. December 1, 2, 8, 9, and 15–22 (weather permitting; heavy rains will cancel). All proceeds from the event benefit the zoo sanctuary animals.

EVENT DETAILS:

- >> Ticket sales open November 1 at webtrac.folsom.ca.us.
- >> Admission and train tickets are only available online; no onsite ticket sales.
- >> Event admission is \$10/person and train tickets are \$5/person; free for ages under 2 years.
- >> Special treats and beverages are available for purchase from Fisher's Beastro and from visiting food trucks.

The Gallery at 48 Natoma hosts a free public reception from 6 to 8 p.m. Friday, November 17, for the new exhibit featuring holiday cards by celebrated artists. The art exhibits continue through January 18.

PUT HOLIDAY WASTE IN ITS PLACE

With holiday cooking and baking, shipping packaging, gift wrapping, decorating, and party-throwing, there is more waste than at any other time of the year. Between Thanksgiving and New Year's, Americans produce 25% more waste—most of which can be kept out of the landfill. Help manage your extra waste using the holiday sorting guide below and put your waste in its place.



GREEN BIN APPROVED

Place all food and food-soiled paper into compostable or clear plastic bags, keeping yard debris loose.

- » All food scraps including meal prep and holiday leftovers.
- Pumpkins, gourds, squash, wreaths, centerpieces, and boughs. Remove wires, ribbons, lights, and other artificial elements before placing items in your Green Bin.
- >> Christmas Trees. Cut into pieces no larger than two feet in length and four inches in diameter, and lids must close completely.



BLUE BIN APPROVED

Place items separately (unbagged).

- Paper including wrapping, gift bags, cards, envelopes, catalogs, and magazines. Items with metallic or glitter embellishments cannot be recycled. Instead, place them in your gray bin.
- >> Glass and plastic bottles.
- >> Aluminum cans.



GRAY BIN APPROVED

- >> Plastic wrapping, plastic bags, padded shipping envelopes, packing peanuts, and air pillows.
- >> Ribbons and bows.
- >> Disposable utensils and coated paper plates.

Not sure where to place an item? Look it up using the Waste Wizard tool at **folsom.ca.us/wastecollection** or on the Folsom Waste Collection app. There is no change to waste collection services.



FROM THE ARCHIVES: FOLSOM'S BLACKSMITHING HISTORY

Before housing the Folsom History Museum, 821 and 823 Sutter Street held Cruickshank's blacksmith shop, a fixture since at least 1910. During the late 1800s and early 1900s, blacksmiths thrived, providing essential services like crafting horseshoes for the community near the train depot. In 1923, the shop relocated to the southwest corner of Decatur Street, leaving the original lot vacant until its sale in 1946.

In the early 2000s, embedded horseshoes could be seen along the sidewalk at the second location before the Sutter Street redevelopment project. Blacksmithing in Folsom remains robust through the Folsom Forge at The Square and the California Blacksmith Association (CBA). Certified blacksmiths offer weekly courses for newcomers and experts, promoting skill development and certification. Folsom's crafting culture extends beyond blacksmithing to encompass pottery, painting, sculpting, glass blowing, writing, and music. Folsom History is diligently working to create a space where all artisans can practice their craft effectively.

City of Folsom Animal Services would like to share some tips and reminders to help ensure that your four-legged family member is a model city resident.

ALWAYS KEEP YOUR DOG ON A LEASH:

For the safety of your dog and others, city codes require that your dog always stay on a leash when not in your home or on your property. Off-leash dogs may be startled and run away from your home or into traffic. Loose dogs may also chase or disturb wildlife, which could injure both your pet and the wild creature. Keep your dog leashed while walking around your neighborhood, on trails, in parks, and near open spaces.

MAKE SURE YOUR PET IS LICENSED:

Licensing your pet is not only required by law; it also helps reunite them with you when they go missing. Licensing your pet with the city's online system is quick and easy, and credit cards are accepted.

PRACTICE GOOD K9 TRAIL ETIQUETTE:

The city has rules to help keep the recreational trails safe and enjoyable for all users, whether on foot, by bike, or by a K9 companion. When walking your dog along trails, dogs should be leashed and kept to the left side of their human (who should also be walking on the left side of the trail). Dog owners should pick up after their pets and discard the waste in a garbage can or at one of the dog waste bag stations.

Enjoy the spirit of the holidays in Folsom! The Folsom community has two great options

for family-friendly holiday tree-lighting events. Palladio's tree lighting takes place at 5 p.m. Saturday, November 18, and the Historic District tree lighting event begins at 6 p.m. Friday, December 1.



Every day is a good day to practice proper disposal of grease products, but hosting gatherings and holiday cooking often means that **f**ats, **o**ils, and **g**rease may be in our kitchens more than usual. The City of Folsom reminds residents that it's important not to pour fats, oils, and grease down the drain, which could lead to clogged pipes and sewer spills.

To help prevent backups, properly dispose of FOG with these four easy steps:

- >> Can It Pour solidified fats and grease into a sturdy container and place it in your garbage.
- >> Scrape It Before washing, scrape fats, oils, and grease from pots and pans into your garbage.
- >> Trash It Put fatty and greasy food scraps in the garbage.
- Recycle It Place cooled cooking oil back into the original container and make an appointment to pick it up through the City of Folsom Door-2-Door residential household hazardous waste program.

FIXING WATER LEAKS IS ALWAYS IN SEASON

Check toilets for leaks before your guests arrive this holiday season. Old toilet flappers often cause leaks when the rubber decays or becomes warped. Replacing a flapper is an inexpensive project that pays for itself. To check for a flapper leak, add a few drops of food coloring to the toilet tank and wait 10 minutes before flushing. If dye appears in the toilet bowl, your toilet leaks.

Folsom residents are eligible for a Flume Smart Home Water Monitor rebate. The Flume monitor works with any water meter, is easy to install, and allows you to view indoor and outdoor water use in real time and get an alert when a leak is detected.

City of Folsom water customers can purchase the Flume device for just \$50 (regularly \$249) after a discount and rebate.

The Indian festival of Diwali or Deepavali, also known as the Festival of Lights, is traditionally celebrated with the use of fireworks. The use of approved fireworks in conjunction with this festival may occur Saturday, November 11, through Sunday, November 12, in the City of Folsom. The Folsom Fire Department is asking the public to take the following precautions when using fireworks during the festival period:

- Make sure the fireworks have the State Fire Marshal "Safe and Sane" seal.
- The use of fireworks for this celebration must be conducted under adult supervision at all times.
- Have a bucket of water, sand, or garden hose available at firing site.
- » Read all instructions before use.

- >> Never alter, modify, or enhance fireworks—use only in the manner intended.
- Make sure fireworks have proper clearance from flammable materials including dry grass and brush.
- Xeep your pets safe by keeping them indoors and providing a quiet, secure place during fireworks displays.

The parade stages in the Target/Home Goods parking lot and begins on East Bidwell Street, travels northbound on Coloma Street, and proceeds to Natoma Street.
