The City of Folsom is developing a plan to revitalize the Central Business District along East Bidwell Street from Riley Street to Blue Ravine Road. The plan will create a vision for the area and guide future development and infrastructure improvements.

As part of the planning effort, the city invited Folsom residents and visitors to share their values, priorities, and vision for the area through an online survey. The 10th annual Love My Mom 5K and Kids' Dash takes place Sunday, May 5. This popular event that celebrates family and community is presented by Folsom Parks & Recreation in partnership with the Palladio and Kaiser. The start is located by Whole Foods, and the course route is fast and flat, making it an ideal route for runners, walkers, and stroller striders—leashed dogs are welcome, too. The fun Kids' Dash for ages 10 and under will be held prior to the start of the 5K, with medals awarded to all registered participants.

Participants in the 5K will be electronically timed and special awards will be presented to top finishers in a variety of categories including single and double strollers, top mom, top female, and top male. Don't let your food scraps go to waste. Banana peels, chicken bones, food-soiled paper, other food scraps, and yard trimmings are the perfect ingredients to make compost through the City of Folsom Green Bin program.

Transforming your food scraps and yard trimmings is easy with the Green Bin program. Place all food scraps and food-soiled paper in a clear plastic or compostable bag, and loose yard trimmings into your Green Bin for weekly pick up.

The City of Folsom collects and transports the contents of the Green Bin to an industrial composting facility where the material is converted into compost. Compost is so beneficial to gardens, yards, and agriculture that it's often referred to as "garden gold."

The Green Bin program is mandatory to comply with California state law that requires all organic material to be diverted away from landfills. This law is a part of California's strategy to reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

FREE COMPOST AVAILABLE FOR YARDS AND GARDENS

Free compost is available for pick up at 50 Natoma Street (behind City Hall) and Hinkle Creek Nature Trail near Fire Station 36 on Oak Avenue Parkway. Piles are stocked regularly and monitored by city employees.

EXHIBIT WALKS THROUGH HALLS OF FOLSOM'S HISTORY

- "Made In Folsom," a temporary exhibit at Folsom History Museum, highlights the high school experience in Folsom and the 100th anniversary of Folsom High School's first freshman class. While you're making plans to see the exhibit, here are some things about Folsom's history you may not know:
- Folsom was originally named Granite City when Joseph Folsom and Theodore Judah were mapping the town. The city was renamed to honor Joseph Folsom after he died in 1855.
- >> Folsom was a stop along the Lincoln Highway, one of the nation's first transcontinental highways, running from Times Square in New York to Lincoln Park in San Francisco. In Folsom, the Lincoln Highway ran down Sutter Street and across the Rainbow Bridge until it was replaced by other routes.
- >> The Wells Fargo Assay building was built in 1860 and at one point was used as an icehouse. It was torn down in 1959, but some parts of the original façade were saved and used by the original Folsom Historical Society to restore the building in 1976.
