

Neighborhood Issues

a. Willow Creek Drive/Thomas Court and Ed Mitchell Park

Robert Kalevas made a public comment.

The Traffic Safety Committee recommends the installation of in-street pedestrian bollards at the intersection of Thomas Court and Willow Creek Drive and enhanced striping of the crosswalk at Thomas Court and Willow Creek Drive. They also recommend the Public Works Department partner with the school district to promote educational efforts through any newsletter or distribution method that the school has in place regarding parking at Ed Mitchell Park. Increased police patrols in the area are also recommended.

6. INFORMATIONAL ITEMS

a. Traffic Safety Committee Action Item Updates

Brausch requested that Tobrurry Way and South Lexington Drive be future agenda items. Bosch explained that we are waiting for radar feedback signs on South Lexington Drive. He said he would contact the community at Tobrurry Way and schedule an agenda item for a future meeting.

Brausch requested larger stop signs be posted at the pedestrian crosswalk at the intersection of Willow Creek Trail and Prewett Drive. Bosch said that larger stop signs would be possible, as well as stop legends on the trail to help alert pedestrians to stop before entering the street.

Goddard asked about the pavement friction work done on Folsom Lake Crossing. Bosch informed the committee that the Public Works Department has requested that a post-project speed survey be performed by a consultant soon.

Brausch asked about speed limits on Folsom Lake Crossing. Bosch explained that now that the project is complete, they are going to complete a valid speed survey and reevaluate that segment of road regarding the speed limit and other factors.

Bailey asked for an update on grant funding for the median barrier project on Folsom Lake Crossing. Bosch replied that he did not have any update.

Bailey asked about the East Bidwell Street and Iron Point Road area of the city. Bosch reported that work would begin this week on reconfiguring the intersection of East Bidwell Street and Iron Point Road. One purpose will be to change the onramp to westbound US-50 to a general-purpose onramp. The city will then restripe the approach to allow two lanes in the approach to the onramp. This will redistribute southbound traffic. In addition, one westbound through lane on Iron Point Road will be converted to an additional left turn lane, creating three left turn lanes to East Bidwell Street These are the beginning changes. They anticipate a very short turnaround time on these improvements. More improvements in that area can be expected in the future.

Goddard asked regarding the Folsom Boulevard construction and striping. Once SacRT is finished with construction then the striping will be redone.

Brausch asked regarding Vista Del Lago students parking on Caversham Way and walking down to the high school. Washburn explained that the school district will be locking the gate into the school that is used as a pass-through. Information will go out to parents and students. More meetings are scheduled to discuss the parking situation. Bosch said that residents have been provided with a petition from our committee if they would like it as a future agenda item.

Brausch asked regarding electric scooter community education. Galovich said that they are wrapping up their education efforts in the community and that the next step will be enforcement.

Galovich suggested a way to improve safety on Iron Point Road in front of Folsom High School. Officers propose that a 5-foot-tall wrought iron fence installed in the median would help stop students from jaywalking across Iron Point Road to get to school and help them walk down to the intersection before crossing. Bosch said that it could be an agenda item on the next Traffic Safety Committee Meeting.

b. Upcoming Traffic Safety Committee Items

The committee unanimously agreed to change the March meeting date from March 28, 2024, to April 4, 2024.

SUBJECT: TOBRURRY WAY UPDATE

BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS

In August of 2023, the Traffic Safety Committee discussed the petition for the installation of "NO STOPPING 10 PM - 6 AM" along the impacted area of Tobrurry Way. As part of the recommended actions of the Committee, a follow-up discussion about the effectiveness of signs was to be performed six months after the installation of the signs.

Public Works staff reached out to the original petitioner to for an update on some of the experiences stated in the email.

- Collection of cars improved but not entirely eliminated.
- Residents' calls to the police are mostly responded to within 15 minutes.
- To their knowledge, no citations were issued.
- Resident provided video links to recent encounters in front of home.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION/TRAFFIC SAFETY COMMITTEE ACTION

The Public Works Department does not have any recommendations for its own department that would deter the continued actions of any visitors to Tobrurry Way. Any deterrents that would obstruct the view would need to be installed on private property, and therefore, cannot be provided by the City. Continued enforcement, as staffing allows, would likely help discourage this behavior.

I'd love to tell you everything is perfect, but I can only say it has improved. It has improved in that on several nights we have seen collections of cars actually pick up and leave at 10 PM. However there are still plenty of night owls showing up in later hours.

From the viewpoint of the Traffic Safety Committee, the S-turn and straightaway in the 300 and 400 block of Tobrurry remain an attractive nuisance to the community. With its lack of gates, discouraging this block as a meeting place should be a focal point for law enforcement.

Checking phone records I've called FPD 8 times since December 1 all during hours of 11PM to 1 AM. In most cases officers arrive within 15 minutes and clear out the street. No citations are ever issued - but there could be many. In addition to CVC 22507 (posted no stopping), loud exhaust, no front plate, obscured plates, wrong side of street are frequently observable. I think it would be a helpful deterrent if the FPD beat unit could make a point of coming through the block between 10:30 and 11:30 every night (when practical to do so), especially Friday/Saturday/Sunday.

Here are a couple of disturbing videos from just last week. The first one is 2 minutes and depicts a late-night beer-chug challenge after which an individual lies down in the street near passing vehicles. The second one is 30-seconds, showing a black Infinity flexing its muscle and nearly swinging into a parked car.



SUBJECT: STOP SIGN REQUEST AT ROCK SPRINGS DRIVE AND

MANGINI PARKWAY

BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS

On February 1 and 2, 2024, Public Works received an email from a concerned resident and from a City Council Member, on behalf of a resident, requesting for the installation of an all-way stop sign at Rock Springs Drive and Mangini Parkway.

A site visit was performed by city staff to evaluate the intersection, and it was found that there are no apparent line-of-sight issues with motorists looking north or south from either side of the intersection. Looking east from the southern leg of Rock Springs Drive, staff observed cars approximately 375' from the intersection just as they approached the crest of the hill. City staff observed about 100' of low-level median landscaping that could be removed to alleviate some of the visibility issues motorists are experiencing.

Similarly, the northern leg of the intersection had adequate visibility looking in both directions; staff was able to observe approaching vehicles with more than enough time to determine whether it was safe to turn or proceed straight. As with the other direction, some median ground cover landscaping could be removed to extend the line-of-sight triangle.

Due to its observed low volumes, lack of accident history, and adequate line of sight, the city staff's analysis using the California Manual for Traffic Control Devices (CAMUTCD) methodology determined that this intersection does not meet warrants for an all-way stop control.



STAFF RECOMMENDATION/TRAFFIC SAFETY COMMITTEE ACTION

Staff recommends that the Committee deny the request for an all-way stop at this time. However, they recommend continued evaluation of the intersection as traffic patterns and volumes dynamically change in this area of Folsom due to the proximity to the park and lack of controlled crossings along Mangini Parkway. This may be a future crosswalk or all-way stop candidate if or when CAMUTCD warrants are met.

SUBJECT: REQUEST FOR MEDIAN FENCE ALONG IRON POINT ROAD

NEAR FOLSOM HIGH SCHOOL

BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS

During the February 2024 Traffic Safety Committee meeting, the Folsom Police Department requested a future agenda item be added to discuss the feasibility, cost, and justification for the City of Folsom to install a fence within the median along Iron Point Road adjacent to the Folsom High School. Folsom Police described a situation where the School Resource Officer assigned to Folsom High witnessed students crossing Iron Point Road outside the designated crosswalk at the Grover and Iron Point intersection. Iron Point Road is a 6-lane arterial roadway with a posted speed limit of 45 MPH outside school zone hours. Other jurisdictions have placed median fencing to discourage this behavior, which is no longer a ticket-able offense since the change in California Code, Section 21955, which states the following:

Between adjacent intersections controlled by traffic control signal devices or by police officers, pedestrians shall not cross the roadway at any place except in a crosswalk.

- (b)(1) A peace officer, as defined in Chapter 4.5 (commencing with Section 830) of Title 3 of Part 2 of the Penal Code, shall not stop a pedestrian for a violation of subdivision (a) unless a reasonably careful person would realize there is an immediate danger of a collision with a moving vehicle or other device moving exclusively by human power.
- (2) This subdivision does not relieve a pedestrian from the duty of using due care for their safety.
- (3) This subdivision does not relieve a driver of a vehicle from the duty of exercising due care for the safety of any pedestrian within the roadway.

Public Works staff performed a site visit with a local contractor with a specialty in the installation of fencing to determine the feasibility and budgetary cost of the proposed project. The project was deemed feasible, with a proposed cost of \$141,000 to install a median of 2,350 feet of 4' tall fencing.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION/TRAFFIC SAFETY COMMITTEE ACTION

The Public Works recommendation would be to discuss the priority level for this project for consideration for the Fiscal Year 2024/2025 budget or a future budget year, utilizing non-general fund funding if possible.

6" gap between bottom rail and ground to provide clearance for landscaping.
