SPRING INTO ACTION: IT'S TIME TO SPRUCE UP YOUR SPRINKLERS!

As we welcome spring in Folsom, it's a great time to dust off your gardening gloves and get outdoor spaces in tip-top shape. One essential task is giving our sprinkler systems the attention they deserve.

Before taking your sprinklers out of hibernation, you will want to perform a thorough check. Ensuring your sprinklers are in good working order promotes a healthy landscape, conserves water, and saves you money in the long run.

HERE ARE SOME STEPS TO GET YOU STARTED ON YOUR SPRINKLER CHECK:

- 1. Turn On Your Sprinkler System: Check each zone one by one to ensure all parts function correctly. Look for any signs of damage, like broken heads or pipes.
- Adjust Sprinkler Heads: Ensure your sprinkler heads are properly adjusted. They should provide even coverage without overshooting or missing spots. If needed, adjust the radius and angle of the spray.
- 3. Clear Debris: Inspect your sprinkler heads and nozzles for debris or clogs. Even small obstructions can disrupt the water flow and affect performance. Clean them thoroughly to maintain proper water distribution.
- 4. Look for Leaks: While your system is running, look for leaks in the pipes, connections, or valves. A leaking sprinkler system can lead to water waste and increased utility bills.
- 5. Set Timers: Ensure your sprinkler timers are correctly set to accommodate the spring weather. As temperatures rise and rainfall fluctuates, you may need to adjust watering schedules accordingly.
- 6. Consider Upgrades: If your sprinkler system is outdated or inefficient, spring is an excellent time to explore modern, water-saving options like smart sprinkler controllers. These devices can adjust watering schedules based on weather data, saving you

even more water and money. City of Folsom Water customers are eligible for irrigation efficiency upgrade rebates to convert inefficient irrigation systems to water-efficient systems.



The trained lifeguarding staff are always on duty during recreation swim.

Dry vegetation can create fire hazards during hot summer months. Folsom has more than 980 acres of city-owned open space, and nearly all of it is weed abated to achieve the required fire safety interface between residential structures and open spaces.

The City of Folsom requires defensible space of at least 30 feet from structures or the property line and the Fire Chief may increase this distance to 100 feet for high-hazard areas. These requirements apply to city-owned property and private property.

The city uses multiple ways to reduce or remove dry vegetation including maintenance staff, contractors, and grazing animals. Many Folsom residents are likely to see goat herds being used to clear areas in and around their neighborhood over the next few months. Goats will be used to clear more than 500 acres of open space in the city this year. The herds of four-legged weed eaters are taking on hundreds of additional acres that were historically cleared with human work crews in the past.

The weed abatement schedule is based on fire hazard ratings determined by the Fire Chief. If you notice an area in need of weed abatement, first check the abatement schedules at www.folsom.ca.us. If you'd like to report an unscheduled weed abatement need on vacant private property, use SeeClickFix Folsom or contact the Folsom Fire Department at 916-461-6300.



Spring is here, and the Waste & Recycling Division is excited to support Folsom residents with free, self-serve compost for use in home gardens and landscapes.

Compost is available on a first-come, first-served basis. City staff monitor and refill the piles regularly. More compost is ordered as local supplies are depleted; a process that can take up to a few days. We appreciate your patience during this busy season!

Shovel your own compost from the following locations:

- >>> Behind Folsom City Hall 50 Natoma Street
- Hinkle Creek Nature Trail near Fire Station 36

Compost is a soil amendment, best mixed with existing soil to improve water retention, texture, and overall soil quality. It can also be applied on top of soil to insulate the soil underneath, reduce evaporation, and regulate temperature. Compost can shock plants if not mixed well or applied properly.

This valuable organic product comes to us as part of SB 1383, the legislation that requires all organic material to be diverted from landfills. Bringing compost back to the community closes the loop on organics recycling, which begins with resident participation in the Green Bin program. FOLSOM'S ADOPT-A-TRAIL PROGRAM HELPS MAINTAIN OUR BEAUTIFUL TRAILS

The Adopt-A-Trail program was developed by Folsom Parks & Recreation to provide the opportunity for community members and organizations to beautify, restore, and help maintain the city's treasured trail system. Through the dedication of our volunteers, the trail system receives the extra attention needed to help keep the trails clear of litter and debris.

Trail sections are adopted in approximate one-mile segments. Adopters are required to make a one-year commitment with regular trail checks and cleanup days. There is no fee to adopt or participate in a cleanup day.

Before you check out for vacation, check in with the Folsom Police Department's Vacation Check Service! As a free service to residents, Citizens Assisting Public Safety (CAPS) volunteers will check your home while you are away on vacation.

The service deters would-be robbers during the busy travel season and provides residents extra protection and peace of mind. As often as once a day, a volunteer will walk the perimeter of the home, check doors and windows to make sure they are locked, and remove any papers or packages that are a tell-tale sign that the resident is not home.
